people who are working very hard at making the village a success.

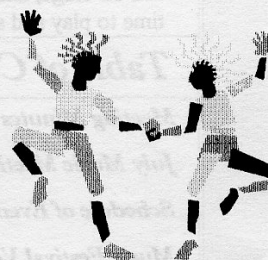

Meeting called to order at 7:12 p.m.

Minutes from meeting dated May 26, 1998 are read and corrected. Greg Knapik motions to accept corrected minutes. Debbie Irons seconds. Motion carries.

Bills are read by John Keyes. Don Dunkelberger motions to pay bills. Larry Burns seconds. Motion carries.

Electrical Report. Repairs are

on hold. State Building Inspector may not have jurisdiction. Kevin will continue to try to get a hold of State Insp. to get an update. City Building Insp. came out to the Village but it is not his jurisdiction either. Also, Reddi Electric will not be volunteering their labor.

Gazebo Report. Plans were suppose to be done last week but Kevin Hurt hasn't heard from them. He will try to get an update from them.

Breeze Building Report. Two shower heads have been picked up. Also need two faucets. Looking at controlled flow faucets. This will control how much hot water can be used.

Archeological Survey Report. Rebecca of Alagonquin & Assoc. never received new form she was waiting for, so she will make up her own to get things moving again.

County Commissioners Report. A decision was finally made to deny our request for funds to match our advertising grant because their budget is already set for the year. We need another way to come up with matching funds. Kevin Hurt has already spent some

time looking for other grants but there's not much out there that can be used to match another grant.

Audit Report. Kevin Hurt will be meeting with Herb next week to go over what he has so far. Herb has been researching on how to do our audit. We could fall under several types of organizations.

Lowe's Account. Report. Lowe's is switching to a corporate AR system which enables our account to be used at any Lowe's, not just the store we set up in.

Fire Extinguisher Report. All Fire Extinguisher's were inspected on June 8, 1998. Three were discharged. One we knew of, 2 we did not. It does cost money to recharge, so please be careful.

Inspection Report. We had an unannounced inspection by the EPA and Health Dept. due to false claims of gray water coming from our kitchens. Nothing was found and we are fine. Kevin and Jennifer Hurt will be away next week. They are leaving Wednesday June 17th and will be back Monday June 22nd.

We received a letter from ASCAP, wants \$50/day for copyrights on songs being played at the festival. Need to bring this before our attorney. Larry Burns will check the internet for letters, notices and records of cases against ASCAP. It may help us in determining how to handle the letter. Jerry Zornes request 60 bales of straw for jam alley. Will need more straw for other seating. There will be a roving photographer at the Festival.

The Way It Was. Other than the quilt, no planning has been done for this festival and it is getting close. We will be handing out flyers to invite musicians from June Festival, back in July. Need ideas from everyone. Bring it to the next meeting. Calling this the "Homecoming".

The Gathering. We'll have to get special use permit if we're going to have shooting.

Cooking Seminar. A big

thanks to our teachers Susie Dunkelberger and Larry Burns. The class went very well and everyone had a good time.

Village T-shirts. The cost through a regular supplier is about \$900 for 12 doz. We do have some alternatives. Ed Dorff used to silk screen T-shirts and baseball caps. He could set us up to do our own. Also, Dennis from LCI can do T-shirts for us, probably cheaper than a regular supplier. Debbie will try to get in contact with him.

Dulcimer Gathering. Jerry Zornes proposes having a Dulcimer Gathering of OH, KY & IN dulcimer clubs at CCPV during the August Festival 1999. Jerry has spoken with the clubs and they are interested. Debbie Irons motions to make August Event a Dulcimer Gathering starting 1999. CCPV would co-host with alternating clubs. Don Dunkelberger seconds. Motion carries. Debbie Irons will notify the groups of our interest. There will be an impromptu meeting at the June Festival with these groups to get feedback.

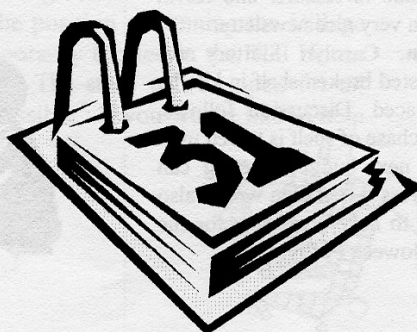

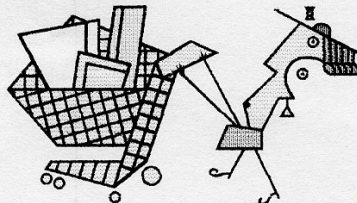

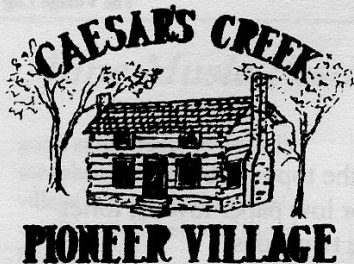
