Statehood Days

Don't forget about Statehood Days this coming weekend, July 10 and 11th, from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Following is a list of "going ons"...

Statehood Days Diversions

Parade - Join in the parade and raising of the Liberty Pole, plus a few (short) patriotic speeches.

Entertainment and other diversions - Music of Morgan's Glade (Prickett's Fort), Steve Black (a.k.a. George Washington), Miss Liberty (in-your-face feminist?), cannon salutes, Methodist circuit rider(s), the Pendragon Puppets.

Simon Kenton Event - Participants in period garb and accoutrements walk/run a specified course, finishing with fire starting, hawk throwing, and the firing of several (blank) charges.

Flintlock Reliability - See who can get the most consecutive shots (blank) from their rifle or musket.

Pie Baking Contest - Bring your Dutch oven and bake a "period" meat, fruit, or vegetable pie. Build your own fire, or we'll provide you with ample coals.

Food and Refreshments for sale during day - roast pig, roast corn, ice cream, and snacks.

Dinner on Saturday, followed by the music of Morgan's Glade. Period dancing if sufficient interest. Please remain in period garb.

Note concerning Weapons - Participants are encouraged to carry period firearms. However, in the interest of safety each participant under arms will be subject to a brief inspection. Firing of blank rounds is permissible based on PRE-APPROVAL.

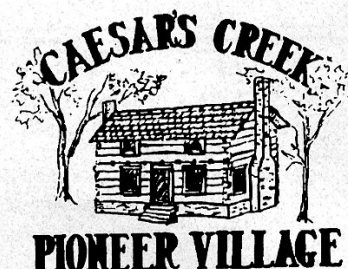

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission and purpose of the Caesar's Creek Pioneer Village Association, a non-profit organization, are as follows:

1. To preserve, restore, and maintain the historic structures of Caesar's Creek Pioneer Village.
(Preservation Function)
 2. To foster, educate and promote a deeper understanding of Caesar's Creek Pioneer Village and its significance to the history of the Southwestern Ohio Frontier during its settlement from 1793-1812. This shall be done by means of research, exhibits, interpretive programs, primitive farming and any other appropriate educational techniques. Also included in this function is a provision for special events that will educate the public. However, these events will not change the permanent historic site. (Education Function)
 3. To establish and maintain collections of objects, furnishings, books, documents and illustrations relating to the history of the settling of the Southwestern Ohio Frontier from 1793-1812. (Collection Function)

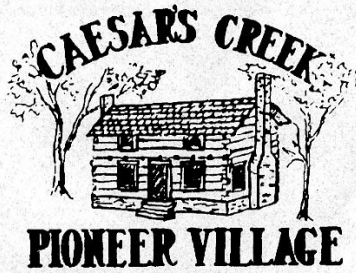
