Letter From The Music Committee

Dear House Parents and Village Volunteers,

The Ole Tyme Music Festival will be held June 26 and 27. This year we will be trying something different with the schedule on Saturday that we hope you will like. We are planning to open at 10:00 a.m. as usual. But that is where the changes start. This year we will have a Village Militia to open the event with a flag raising ceremony. Our crafts show and music workshops will start at 10:00 a.m. The music on the stages is scheduled to start at 12:00 noon and continue until 11:00 p.m. with a break for dinner from 5:15 until 6:00.

We look forward to seeing you and hope you will like the Saturday format.

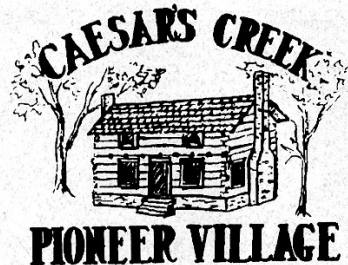

The mission and purpose of the Caesar's Creek Pioneer Village Association, a non-profit organization, are as follows:

1. To preserve, restore, and maintain the historic structures of Caesar's Creek Pioneer Village.
(Preservation Function)
 2. To foster, educate and promote a deeper understanding of Caesar's Creek Pioneer Village and its significance to the history of the Southwestern Ohio Frontier during its settlement from 1793-1812. This shall be done by means of research, exhibits, interpretive programs, primitive farming and any other appropriate educational techniques. Also included in this function is a provision for special events that will educate the public. However, these events will not change the permanent historic site. (Education Function)
 3. To establish and maintain collections of objects, furnishings, books, documents and illustrations relating to the history of the settling of the Southwestern Ohio Frontier from 1793-1812. (Collection Function)

Rally 'round Our Flag

Our new 15 star/15 stripe flag will be flaunted during the Statehood Days event. The all-silk flag was sewn by Betsy Moss Keyes, who was volunteered by her husband, John. Betsy did a wonderful job, and is assured of a prominent place in history for her effort.

The stars, especially, stand out on this flag. They are over-sized by today's standards, somewhat misshapen, point in random directions, and have raw edges. These are all common characteristics of flags of the pre-Civil War period.

After the War of 1812, the nickname of Star Spangled Banner become popular for the particular flag. This was the official design from 1795 until 1818, when it was changed to 20 stars/13 stripes.

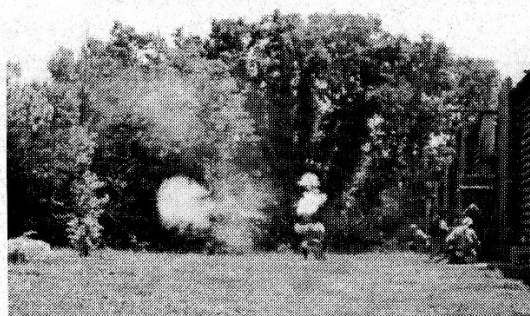

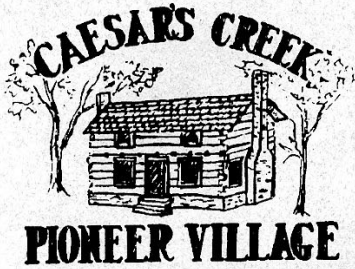
